The Los Angeles Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (LA COE) prepared this report to provide regional labor market supply and demand data related to one above middle-skill occupation:

- **Education and Childcare Administrators, Preschool and Daycare (11-9031)** Plan, direct, or coordinate academic or nonacademic activities of preschools or childcare centers and programs, including before- and after-school care.¹

and three middle-skill occupations:

- **Preschool Teachers, Except Special Education (25-2011)** Instruct preschool-aged students, following curricula or lesson plans, in activities designed to promote social, physical, and intellectual growth.²
- **Teaching Assistants, Except Postsecondary (25-9045)** This occupation includes the 2018 SOC occupations:³
 - **Teaching Assistants, Preschool, Elementary, Middle, and Secondary School, Except Special Education (25-9042)** Assist a preschool, elementary, middle, or secondary school teacher with instructional duties. Serve in a position for which a teacher has primary responsibility for the design and implementation of educational programs and services.
 - **Teaching Assistants, Special Education (25-9043)** Assist a preschool, elementary, middle, or secondary school teacher to provide academic, social, or life skills to students who have learning, emotional, or physical disabilities. Serve in a position for which a teacher has primary responsibility for the design and implementation of educational programs and services.

- **Teaching Assistants, All Other (25-9049)** All teaching assistants not listed separately.
- **Childcare Workers (39-9011)** Attend to children at schools, businesses, private households, and childcare institutions. Perform a variety of tasks, such as dressing, feeding, bathing, and overseeing play.⁴

Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree.⁵ Although *education and childcare administrators, preschool and daycare* typically require a bachelor's degree, it is included in this report since community colleges have historically trained for this occupation. This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with the relevant occupations.

Based on the available data, there appears to be a supply gap for these child development occupations in the region. While the majority of annual openings have entry-level wages that are lower than the self-sufficiency standard wage in both Los Angeles and Orange counties, nearly half of annual openings in the region typically require some college/no degree or an associate degree. **Therefore, due to some of the criteria being met, the LA COE endorses this proposed program.** Detailed reasons include:

Demand:

- **Supply Gap Criteria** – Over the next five years, **19,346 jobs** are projected to be available annually in the region due to new job growth and replacements, which is **more** than the three-year average of **6,533 awards** conferred by educational institutions in the region.
- **Living Wage Criteria** – Within Los Angeles County, the majority (99%) of annual job openings for these child development occupations have entry-level wages **below** the self-sufficiency standard hourly wage (\$18.10/hour).⁶
- **Educational Criteria** – Within the greater LA/OC region, **56% of the annual job openings** for occupations related to child development **typically require a high school diploma or equivalent.**
 - However, the national-level educational attainment data indicates **between 34% and 39% of workers** in the three occupations with the largest number of regional annual openings (*preschool teachers, except special education; teaching*

assistants, except postsecondary; and childcare workers) have completed **some college or an associate degree**.

Supply:

- There are **27 community colleges** in the greater LA/OC region that issue awards related to child development and early care and education, conferring an average of **4,831 awards annually** between 2019 and 2022.
- Between 2019 and 2021, there was an average of **1,702 awards conferred annually** in related training programs by non-community college institutions throughout the greater LA/OC region.

Occupational Demand

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for these child development occupations. In the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to increase by 1% through 2027. There will be more than 19,300 annual job openings per year through 2027 due to job growth and replacements.

Wages

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for these child development occupations in Los Angeles County as they relate to the county’s self-sufficiency standard wage. Orange County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the greater LA/OC region. Detailed wage information, by county, is included in Appendix A.

Los Angeles County

The majority (99%) of annual openings for these child development occupations have entry-level wages below the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County). Typical entry-level hourly wages range between \$14.03 and \$21.10. Only one occupation in this report has entry-level wages above the county’s self-sufficiency standard wage: *Education and childcare administrators, preschool and daycare* (\$21.10). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages between \$18.31 and \$34.27, which are higher than the self-sufficiency standard.

Orange County

All four occupations have entry-level wages below the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$20.63 in Orange County). Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$14.00 and \$20.33. Experienced *childcare workers* can expect to earn \$16.99, which is lower than the county’s self-sufficiency standard. However, experienced *education and childcare administrators, preschool and daycare; preschool teachers, except special education; and teaching assistants, except postsecondary* can expect to earn wages between \$22.43 and \$32.45, which are higher than the self-sufficiency standard.



On average, the entry-level earnings for the occupations in this report are \$17.44; this is below the living wage for one single adult in Los Angeles County (\$18.10). Exhibit 4 shows the average wage for the occupations in this report, from entry-level to experienced workers.


Exhibit 4: Average Hourly Earnings for Child Development Occupations in LA/OC



Job Postings

There were 12,262 online job postings related to child development listed in the past 12 months. Exhibit 5 displays the number of job postings by occupation. The majority of job postings (49%) were for *preschool teachers, except special education*, followed by *teaching assistants, preschool, elementary, middle, and secondary school, except special education* (31%) and *childcare workers* (15%). The highest number of job postings were for preschool teachers, childcare teachers, preschool teacher assistants, infant/toddler teachers, and instructional aides. The top skills were preschool education, child development, early childhood education, working with children, and lesson planning. The top three employers, by number of job postings, in the region were KinderCare Education, Learning Care Group, and Stepping Stones.

Educational Attainment

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists the following typical entry-level education levels for the occupations in this report:

- **Bachelor's degree:** *Education and childcare administrators, preschool and daycare*
- **Associate degree:** *Preschool teachers, except special education*
- **Some college, no degree:** *Teaching assistants, except postsecondary*
- **High school diploma or equivalent:** *Childcare workers*

In the greater LA/OC region, the majority of annual job openings (55%) typically require a high school diploma or equivalent. However, the national-level educational attainment data indicates between 34% and 39% of workers in the three occupations with the largest number of regional annual openings (*preschool teachers, except special education; teaching assistants, except postsecondary; and childcare workers*) have completed some college or an associate degree. Of the 58% of child development job postings listing a minimum education requirement in the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, 63% (4,476) requested high school or vocational training, 19% (1,351) requested an associate degree, and 18% (1,292) requested a bachelor's degree.

Educational Supply

Community College Supply

Exhibit 6 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in programs that have historically trained for the occupations of interest. The colleges with the most completions in the region are East LA, Santa Monica, and Santa Ana.

Non-Community College Supply


For a comprehensive regional supply analysis, it is important to consider the supply from other institutions in the region that provide training programs for child development. Exhibit 7 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by these institutions in relevant programs. Due to different data collection periods, the most recent three-year period of available data is from 2019 to 2021. Between 2019 and 2021, non-community college institutions in the region conferred an average of 1,702 bachelor's and sub-baccalaureate awards. Bachelor's awards are included since one of the occupations in this report typically requires a bachelor's degree. Sub-baccalaureate awards include associate degrees, postsecondary awards, and other academic awards.
