

## Program Endorsement Brief: 0956.50/Welding Technology

### **Summary Analysis**

The Orange County Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (COE) prepared this report to provide Los Angeles/Orange County regional labor market supply and demand data related to one middle-skill occupation: welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers (51-4121). Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree. This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with the relevant occupations.

Based on the available data there appears to be a supply gap for welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers in the region. While the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a high school diploma or equivalent as the typical entry-level education for this occupation, nearly one-third of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education. However, entry-level wages are lower than the living wage in both Orange and Los Angeles counties. Therefore, due to some of the criteria being met, the COE endorses this proposed program. Detailed reasons include:

#### **Demand:**

Supply Gap Criteria – Over the next five years, there is projected to be 1,120 jobs
 available annually in the region due to retirements and workers leaving the field,
 which is more than the 364 awards conferred annually by educational institutions in
 the region.

- Living Wage Criteria Within Orange County, typical entry-level hourly wages for welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers are \$16.17, which is lower than the living wage for one adult in the region (\$20.63 in Orange County).<sup>2</sup>
  - However, median wages are higher than the living wage, suggesting that workers can attain the living wage with additional work experience.
- Educational Criteria The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a high school diploma or equivalent as the typical entry-level education for welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers.
  - However, the national-level educational attainment data indicates that nearly one-third of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education.

### Supply:

- There are 12 community colleges in the LA/OC region that issue awards related to welding technology, conferring an average of 274 awards annually between 2017 and 2020.
- Between 2016 and 2019, there was an average of 90 awards conferred annually in related training programs by non-community college institutions, all of which were generated by two individual non-community college institutions throughout the region.

#### **Occupational Demand**

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers. In Los Angeles/Orange County, the number of jobs related to this occupation is projected to decrease by 3% through 2025. However, there will be more than 1,100 job openings per year through 2025 due to retirements and workers leaving the field.

This report includes employment projection data by Emsi which uses EDD information. Emsi's projections are modeled on recorded (historical) employment figures and incorporate several underlying assumptions, including the assumption that the economy, during the projection period, will be at approximately full employment. To the extent that a recession or labor shock, such as the economic effects of COVID-19, can cause long-term structural change, it may impact the projections. At this time, it is not possible to quantify the impact of COVID-19 on projections of industry and occupational employment. Therefore, the projections included in this report do not take the impacts of COVID-19 into account.

#### Wages

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers in Orange County as they relate to the county's living wage. Los Angeles County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the LA/OC region. Detailed wage information, by county, is included in Appendix A.

**Orange County:** The typical entry-level hourly wages for welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers are \$16.17, which is below the living wage for one adult (\$20.63 in Orange County). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages of \$26.35, which is higher than the living wage estimate. Orange County's average wages are below the average statewide wage of \$23.88 for this occupation.

Los Angeles County: The typical entry-level hourly wages for welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers are \$15.63, which is below the living wage for one adult (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages of \$25.76, which is higher than the living wage estimate. Los Angeles County's average wages are below the average statewide wage of \$23.88 for this occupation.

#### Job Postings

There were 1,222 online job postings related to welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers listed in the past 12 months. The highest number of job postings were for welders, TIG welders, and MIG welders. The top skills were welding, MIG and TIG welding, welding equipment, and repair. The top three employers, by number of job postings, in the region were SpaceX, Waste Management, and Precision Castparts.

It is important to note that the job postings data included in this section reflects online job postings listed in the past 12 months and does not yet demonstrate the impact of COVID-19. While employers have generally posted fewer online job postings since the beginning of the pandemic, the long-term effects are currently unknown.

#### **Educational Attainment**

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a high school diploma or equivalent as the typical entry-level education for welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers. However, the national-level educational attainment data indicates 32.1% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of education. Of the 37% of welding job postings listing a minimum education requirement in Los Angeles/Orange County, 97.8% (439) requested a high school diploma or vocational training and 1.3% (6) requested an associate degree.

### **Educational Supply**

Community College Supply—Exhibit 2 shows the three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in the related TOP code: Welding Technology (0956.50). The colleges with the most completions in the region are Cerritos, Santa Ana, El Camino, and LA Trade. Over the past 12 months, there was one other related program recommendation request from regional community colleges.

Non-Community College Supply—For a comprehensive regional supply analysis, it is also important to consider the supply from other institutions in the region that provide training programs for welders, cutters, solderers, and brazers. Exhibit 3 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by these institutions in the related Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) Code: Welding Technology/Welder (48.0508). Due to different data collection periods, the most recent three-year period of available data is from 2016 to 2019. Between 2016 and 2019, non-community college institutions in the region conferred an average of 90 awards annually in related training programs.
