Program Recommendation

This report was compiled by the South Central Coast: Center of Excellence to provide regional labor market data for the program recommendation of Accounting. This report can help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from programs of study (CCC and non-CCC) that align with this occupation group.

- In the South Central Coast region, the number of jobs related to Accounting is expected to increase over the next five years.
- Financial Managers, Accountants and Auditors, and Budget Analysts are anticipated to experience a low risk of automation while Tax Preparers and Bookkeeping, Accounting, and Auditing Clerks are at high risk of automation.
- In 2017 there were 716 regional completions from programs related to the occupations identified in this analysis as related to Accounting, and 2,828 openings, indicating an undersupply.
- Typical entry-level education ranges from a high school diploma or equivalent for Tax Preparers, some college, no degree for Bookkeeping, Accounting, and Auditing Clerks, to an Bachelor's degree for Accountants and Auditors, Budget Analysts, and Financial Managers.
- Completers of the Accounting program (TOP 0502.00) from the 2015-2016 academic year had a median annual wage upon completion of \$31,613.
- 59% of students are earning a living.
- 70% of students are employed within a year after completing a program.

¹ The South Central Coast Region consists of San Luis Obispo County, Santa Barbara County, Ventura County, and the following cities from North Los Angeles County: Canyon Country, Castaic, Lake Hughes, Lancaster, Littlerock, Llano, Newhall, Palmdale, Pearblossom, Santa Clarita, Stevenson Ranch, and Valencia.

Occupation Codes and Descriptions

Currently, there are five occupations in the standard occupational classification (SOC) system that were identified as relevant for this analysis. The occupation titles and descriptions, as well as reported job titles are included in Exhibit 1.

Earnings

In the South Central Coast region, the average wage for the listed occupations is \$28.64 per hour.

Exhibit 3 contains hourly wages and annual average earnings for this occupation. Entry-level hourly earnings is represented by the 25th percentile of wages, median hourly earnings is represented by the 50th percentile of wages, and experienced hourly earnings is represented by the 75th percentile of wages, demonstrating various levels of employment.

Employer Job Postings

In this research brief, real-time labor market information is used to provide a more nuanced view of the current job market, as it captures job advertisements for occupations relevant to the field of study. Employer job postings are consulted to understand who is employing accountants, and what they are looking for in potential candidates. To identify job postings related to Accounting, the following standard occupational classifications were used:

The CTE LaunchBoard provides student outcome data on the effectiveness of CTE programs. The following student outcome information was collected from exiters of the Accounting program (TOP Code: 0502.00) in the South Central Coast region for the 2015-16 academic year.

- The median annual wage for students after exiting is \$31,613
- Starting salary in the region for Brokerage Clerks is \$57,075
- 59% of students are earning a living wage
- 70% of students are employed within a year after completing a program

Notes

Data included in this analysis represents the labor market demand for positions most closely related to accounting. Standard occupational classification (SOC) codes were chosen based on the national education level required for employment (associate degree and postsecondary certificate) as well as the proportion of current workers who hold a community college award or have had some community college training. This selection process narrows the labor market analysis to the most relevant employment opportunities for students with community college education and/or training.

Traditional labor market information was used to show current and projected employment based on data trends, as well as annual average awards granted by regional community colleges. Real-time labor market information captures job post advertisements for occupations relevant to the field of study and should not be used to establish current job openings, because the numbers may include duplicate job postings or postings intended to gather a pool of applicants. Real-time labor market information can signal demand and show what employers are looking for in potential employees, but is not a perfect measure of the quantity of open positions.
