

# Labor Market Analysis: 1251.00/Paramedic Paramedic

Certificate requiring 30 to <60 semester units Los Angeles Center of Excellence, June 2023

The Los Angeles Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (LA COE) prepared this report to provide regional labor market supply and demand data related to one middle-skill occupation:

Paramedics (29-2043) Administer basic or advanced emergency medical care and assess
injuries and illnesses. May administer medication intravenously, use equipment such as
EKGs, or administer advanced life support to sick or injured individuals.<sup>1</sup>

Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree.<sup>2</sup> This report is intended to help determine whether there is demand in the local labor market that is not being met by the supply from community college programs that align with the relevant occupations.

Based on the available data there does not appear to be a supply gap for the occupations of interest. However, the oversupply is with the COE's acceptable margin (25% over or under the number of annual openings) and is therefore considered "supply met" rather than a "supply gap." While this program does not meet the traditional supply/demand endorsement criteria, there may be demand for these workers from local employers that is not reflected in traditional labor market data. For this reason, real-time labor market data is included in this report as well — to provide a more nuanced view of the regional job market for paramedics. It is also worth noting that not all certified paramedics actually work in the specific occupation designated for paramedics. Other professionals might also pursue a paramedic license, including firefighters,

emergency medical services instructors, flight medics, ski patrol medics, physicians, physician's assistants, dentists, and others working in the health and public safety fields. Furthermore, entry-level wages exceed the self-sufficiency standard wage in both Los Angeles and Orange counties, and the majority of annual openings for *paramedics* typically require a postsecondary non-degree award, as well as additional state licensing. Therefore, due to all of the criteria being met, the LA COE endorses this proposed program. Detailed reasons include:

#### **Demand:**

- Supply Gap Criteria Over the next five years, 115 jobs are projected to be available annually in the region due to new job growth and replacements, which is less than the three-year average of 146 awards conferred by educational institutions in the region.
  - Although there are more awards conferred than job openings, the data suggests that the demand has been met for these occupations within the LA/OC region since the three-year average number of awards (supply) is within the COE's 25% margin of annual job openings (demand).
  - Over the past 12 months, there were 627 online job postings for paramedics.
    The highest number of job postings were for paramedics, emergency response
    managers, emergency medical technician-paramedics, waterpark attendants,
    and paramedic instructors.
- Living Wage Criteria Within Los Angeles County, the typical entry-level hourly wage for paramedics is \$23.56, which is higher than the self-sufficiency standard hourly wage (living wage) for one adult in the region (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County).<sup>3</sup>
- Educational Criteria The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a postsecondary non-degree award as the typical entry-level education for paramedics.
  - Furthermore, the national-level educational attainment data indicates 66% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree.

# Supply:

- There are 4 community colleges in the greater LA/OC region that issue awards related to paramedics, conferring an average of 146 awards annually between 2018 and 2021.
- In 2022, there were 154 individuals that took the **NREMT Paramedic Initial Exam and** 131 passed (85% pass rate).

# **Occupational Demand**

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for *paramedics*. In the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to increase by 9% through 2026. There will be 115 job openings per year through 2026 due to job growth and replacements.

### Wages

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for *paramedics* in Los Angeles County as they relate to the county's self-sufficiency standard wage. Orange County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the greater LA/OC region. Detailed wage information, by county, is included in Appendix A.

### Los Angeles County

The typical entry-level hourly wages for *paramedics* are \$23.56, which is <u>above</u> the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$18.10 in Los Angeles County). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages of \$29.99.

### **Orange County**

The typical entry-level hourly wages for paramedics are \$22.32, which is <u>above</u> the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$20.63 in Orange County). Experienced workers can expect to earn wages of \$28.66.

On average, the entry-level earnings for the occupations in this report are \$22.96; this is above the living wage for one single adult in Los Angeles County (\$18.10). Exhibit 4 shows the average wage for the occupations in this report, from entry-level to experienced workers.




Exhibit 4: Average Hourly Earnings for Paramedics in LA/OC

# **Job Postings**

There were 627 online job postings related to *paramedics* listed in the past 12 months. The highest number of job postings were for paramedics, emergency response managers, emergency medical technician paramedics, waterpark attendants, and paramedic instructors. The top skills were ambulances, medical equipment, electrocardiography, defibrillation, and intravenous hydration. The top three employers, by number of job postings, in the region were AMR, PM Ambulance, and Global Medical Response.

### **Educational Attainment**

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a postsecondary non-degree award as the typical entry-level education for paramedics. Furthermore, the national-level educational attainment data indicates 66% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree. Of the 88% of paramedic job postings listing a minimum education requirement in the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, 98% (537) requested high school or vocational training, 2% (11) requested an associate degree, and 2% (>1%) requested a bachelor's degree.

# **Educational Supply**

### **Community College Supply**

Exhibit 5 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in the related TOP code: Paramedic (1251.00). The colleges with the most completions in the region are El Camino, Saddleback, and West LA.

## **Non-Community College Supply**

For a comprehensive regional supply analysis, it is important to consider the supply from other institutions in the region that provide training programs for paramedics. Over the most recent three-year period with available data, the only institution that report related completions to IPEDS was East San Gabriel Valley ROP. However, the last year that this program issued related awards was in 2018-19, totaling 32 awards that take less than one year to complete. Based on information available online, it appears that this institution only provides EMT training now.<sup>5</sup>

Beyond completions reported to IPEDS, UCLA's Center for Prehospital Care offers EMT and Paramedic training programs, but does not report completions from their program to IPEDS, but rather only NREMT Paramedic Initial Exam Pass Rates (covered in more detail below).<sup>6</sup>

### **EMS Personnel Training Programs**

In California, paramedic training programs are approved by the local EMS agency by county. Paramedic training programs in California are required to be accredited by the Committee on Accreditation of Educational Programs for Emergency Medical Service Processions (CoAEMSP).<sup>7</sup> Currently, there are five approved paramedic training programs in the LA/OC region:<sup>8</sup>

- Los Angeles County Paramedic Training Institute (Santa Fe Springs)
- Mt. San Antonio College Paramedic Program (Walnut)
- Orange County Emergency Medical Training (Lake Forest)
- Saddleback College (Mission Viejo)
- UCLA Paramedic Education Program (Los Angeles)

Passing rates for the NREMT Paramedic exam for Los Angeles County programs are listed in Exhibit 6. Please note that these exam pass rates differ from the program award numbers in Exhibit 5 since not all completers take this exam immediately, or in the same year that they earn their award, and in some cases not at all.

For most career education programs, the COE compares the number of completions from related programs (supply) to the number of projected job openings (demand) in the region in order to determine if a supply gap exists. In this particular case, it is best to both consider the traditional supply figures as well as the NREMT Paramedic Initial Exam Pass Rates since only the individuals that pass this exam that are eligible to work as paramedics, whereas a certificate or degree in paramedic studies is not sufficient for employment as a paramedic. Therefore, it is likely more useful to compare the 131 passing scores on the paramedic exam to the 115 average annual job openings than it is to consider the 146 awards issued from community college paramedic programs.
