

Personal Trainer Occupations

Inland Empire/ Desert Region (Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario Metropolitan Statistical Area)

Summary

- Employment growth for the personal trainer occupational group is expected to increase by 13% through 2021; 3,265 job openings will be available over the next five years in the Inland Empire/ Desert Region.
- The median wage for all personal trainer occupations are **above the MIT Living Wage** estimate of \$12.10 per hour for a single adult living in the Inland Empire/Desert Region.
- Based on the average annual number of program completions for the selected community college program (19 average annual awards), and the annual openings for personal trainer occupations in the local region (653 annual job openings), there appears to be an opportunity for program growth.

Job Opportunities

In 2016, there were more than 3,400 personal trainer occupational group jobs in the Inland Empire/Desert Region. Across the local region, employment related to the personal trainer occupational group is expected to increase 13% through 2021. Employers in the region will need to hire 3,265 workers over the next five years to fill new jobs and to backfill jobs that workers are permanently leaving (includes retirements). Appendix A, Table 1show the projected job growth for each of the occupations in this group.

Over the last 12 months (October 2016 to September 2017), there were 243 advertisements (ads) for jobs in the personal trainer occupational group in the Inland Empire/Desert Region. In the fullyear 2016 there were 357 job ads; 316 job ads in 2015; 392 job ads in 2014; and 363 job ads in 2013. Exhibit 2 shows the number of job ads posted during the last 12 months for each of the occupations in the personal trainer occupational group.

Earnings

The median wage for all personal trainer occupations are above the MIT Living Wage estimate of \$12.10 per hour for a single adult living in the Inland Empire/Desert Region. See Exhibit 3 for wage information by occupation for the Inland Empire/Desert Region and California.

Work Locations, Skills, and Education

According to job ads, the top worksite regional cities for jobs in this occupational group were San Bernardino, Murrieta, and Loma Linda. The top employers posting jobs ads were 24 Hour Fitness, Rialto Unified School District, and In Shape Health Clubs Incorporated. Exhibit 4 lists the top



specialized, soft, and software and programming skills that employers are seeking when looking for workers to fill personal trainer positions.

0835.20 – Fitness Trainer program outcomes in the Inland Empire/Desert Region in academic year 2014-15:

- The median annual earnings is 9,260 (California median = 13,035).
- No living wage data available in local region (26%).
- No median change in earnings data available in local region (28%).
- No number of students employed within six months data available in local region (66%).

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Appendix A: Occupation definitions, five-year projections, and earnings for personal trainer occupations

Occupation Definitions (SOC code), Education and Training Requirement, Community College Education Attainment

Athletic Trainers (299091)

Evaluate and advise individuals to assist recovery from or avoid athletic-related injuries or illnesses, or maintain peak physical fitness. May provide first aid or emergency care.

Entry-Level Educational Requirement: Bachelor's Degree

Training Requirement: None

Percentage of incumbent workers with a Community College Award or Some Postsecondary Coursework: 22%

Fitness Trainers and Aerobics Instructors (399031)

Instruct or coach groups or individuals in exercise activities. Demonstrate techniques and form, observe participants, and explain to them corrective measures necessary to improve their skills.

Entry-Level Educational Requirement: High school diploma or equivalent

Training Requirement: Less than one month on-the-job training

Percentage of incumbent workers with a Community College Award or Some Postsecondary Coursework: 34%
