



Labor Market Analysis: 3007.00 – Cosmetology and Barbering 12.0409 – Aesthetician/Esthetician and Skin Care Specialist *Esthetician – Certificate requiring 16 to fewer than 30 semester units*

SUMMARY

This report analyzes whether local labor market demand is being met by community college programs aligned with the identified middle-skill occupations¹ or whether a shortage of workers exists. Labor market demand is measured by annual job openings while education supply is measured by the number of awards (degrees and certificates) conferred on average each year.

Based on the available data, there appears to be a supply gap for the three identified middle-skill occupations in the region. While the majority of annual openings have entry-level wages that are lower than the self-sufficiency standard wage in both Los Angeles and Orange counties, the Bureau of Labor Statistics lists a postsecondary non-degree award as the typical entry-level education level for all three occupations.

Recommendation: Due to two of three program endorsement criteria being met, the Los Angeles Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (LA COE) endorses this proposed program.

Key Findings

Supply Gap

- 4,853 annual job openings are projected in the region through 2029. This number is greater than the three-year average of 4,016 awards conferred by educational institutions in the region.

¹ Middle-skill occupations typically require some postsecondary education, but less than a bachelor's degree. The COE classifies middle-skill jobs as the following:

- All occupations that require an educational requirement of some college, associate degree or apprenticeship;
- All occupations that require a bachelor's degree, but also have more than one-third of their existing labor force with an educational attainment of some college or associate degree; or
- All occupations that require a high school diploma or equivalent or no formal education, but also require short- to long-term on-the-job training where multiple community colleges have existing programs.

- However, the SOC codes in this report include a variety of cosmetology jobs, including estheticians and skincare specialists. Since the SOC codes do not solely represent estheticians, **the number of annual job openings is likely overstated.**
- Over the past 12 months, there were **702 online job postings related to estheticians and skincare specialists.** The highest number of job postings were for estheticians, licensed aestheticians, aestheticians, wax specialists, and medical aestheticians.

Living Wage

- 96% of annual job openings for these middle-skill cosmetology occupations have entry-level wages below Los Angeles County's self-sufficiency standard hourly wage (\$24.03/hour).²

Educational Attainment

- A postsecondary non-degree award is the typical entry-level education for the target cosmetology occupations, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS).
 - 44%-51% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree, according to national educational attainment data.

Community college supply

- 11 community colleges issued awards related to cosmetology in the greater LA/OC region.
 - 1,277 awards (degrees and certificates) were conferred on average each year between 2023 and 2025.

Other postsecondary supply

- 32 educational institutions in the LA/OC region have conferred awards in programs related to cosmetology over the past three years.
 - 2,739 awards were conferred on average each year by other postsecondary institutions throughout the greater LA/OC region between 2022 and 2024.

TARGET OCCUPATIONS

LA COE prepared this report to provide regional labor market and postsecondary supply data related to three middle-skill cosmetology occupations. [For full occupation descriptions, please see Appendix.](#)

- **Hairdressers, Hairstylists, and Cosmetologists (39-5012)** ³
- **Makeup Artists, Theatrical and Performance (39-5091)** ⁴

OCCUPATIONAL DEMAND

Exhibit 1 shows the five-year occupational demand projections for these middle-skill cosmetology occupations. In the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, the number of jobs related to these occupations is projected to increase by 6% through 2029. There will be nearly 4,900 job

openings per year through 2029 due to job growth and replacements. It is important to note that these SOC codes include various cosmetology occupations and not solely estheticians. Therefore, the data in Exhibit 1 is likely overstated for estheticians. The majority of jobs in 2024 for these middle-skill cosmetology occupations (75%) were located in Los Angeles County.

Detailed Occupation Data

Exhibit 2 displays the current employment and projected occupational demand for each of the target occupations in Los Angeles County. The average percentage of workers aged 55+ across all occupations in the Los Angeles/Orange County region is 26%; occupations with a larger share of workers aged 55 and older typically have greater replacement needs to offset the amount of impending retirements. On average, 81% of workers across all occupations in California are employed full-time. Occupations with a lower-than-average percentage of full-time workers may have less employment security but may see increased activity in the gig economy.

WAGES

The labor market endorsement in this report considers the entry-level hourly wages for these middle-skill cosmetology occupations in Los Angeles County as they relate to the county's self-sufficiency standard wage. Orange County wages are included below in order to provide a complete analysis of the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region.

Los Angeles County

The majority, 96%, of annual openings for these middle-skill cosmetology occupations have entry-level wages below the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$24.03 in Los Angeles County). Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$13.73 and \$32.85. (Exhibit 3).

One occupation has entry-level wages above the self-sufficiency standard wage:

- *Makeup artists, theatrical and performance*, \$32.85

Experienced *skincare specialists* can expect to earn \$22.72, which is below the self-sufficiency standard wage. However, experienced *hairstylists and cosmetologists* and *makeup artists, theatrical and performance* can expect to earn wages between \$29.47 and \$66.84, which are higher than the self-sufficiency standard.

Orange County

The majority, 98%, of annual openings for these middle-skill cosmetology occupations have entry-level wages below the self-sufficiency standard wage for one adult (\$27.13 in Orange County). Typical entry-level hourly wages are in a range between \$15.03 and \$29.68 (Exhibit 4).

One occupation has entry-level wages above the self-sufficiency standard wage:

- *Makeup artists, theatrical and performance*, \$29.68

Experienced *skincare specialists* can expect to earn \$21.68, which is below the self-sufficiency standard wage. However, experienced *hairstylists and cosmetologists* and *makeup artists, theatrical and performance* can expect to earn wages between \$28.84 and \$60.75, which are higher than the self-sufficiency standard.

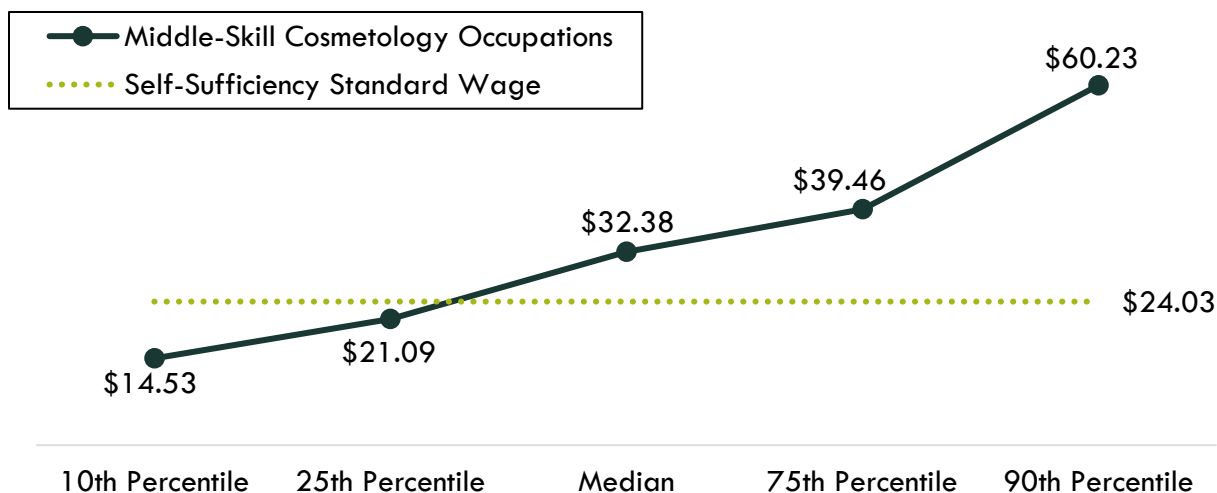

Across the greater Los Angeles and Orange County region, the average entry-level hourly earnings for the occupations in this report are \$21.09; this is below the living wage for one single adult in Los Angeles County (\$24.03). Exhibit 5 shows the average hourly wage for the occupations in this report, for entry-level to experienced workers.

JOB POSTINGS BY TITLE

In the past 12 months in Los Angeles and Orange Counties, there were 702 job postings for esthetician and skincare-related job titles. Job postings were analyzed for the most common job titles, skills, and employers associated with the target occupations in this report (Exhibit 6). In the greater Los Angeles/Orange County region, 18% of the target job postings listed a minimum educational requirement. Exhibit 7 details the number and percentage of job postings by educational level.

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists a postsecondary non-degree award as the typical entry-level education for all three of the target occupations (Exhibit 8). Furthermore, the national-level data indicates between 44% and 51% of workers in the field have completed some college or an associate degree as their highest level of educational attainment. The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) lists the following typical entry-level education levels for the occupations in this report:

Community College Supply

Exhibit 9 shows the annual and three-year average number of awards conferred by community colleges in the related TOP code: Cosmetology and Barbering (3007.00). The colleges with the most completions in the region are LA Trade-Tech, Santa Monica, and Citrus.

Other Postsecondary Supply

For a comprehensive regional supply analysis, it is important to consider the supply from other institutions in the region that provide training programs for these middle-skill cosmetology occupations. Exhibit 11 shows the number of awards conferred by these institutions in relevant programs. Due to different data collection periods, the most recent data is from 2022 to 2024. Between 2022 and 2024, other postsecondary college institutions in the region conferred an average of 2,739 sub-baccalaureate awards. Sub-baccalaureate awards include associate degrees, postsecondary awards, and other academic awards that typically take fewer than four years to complete.

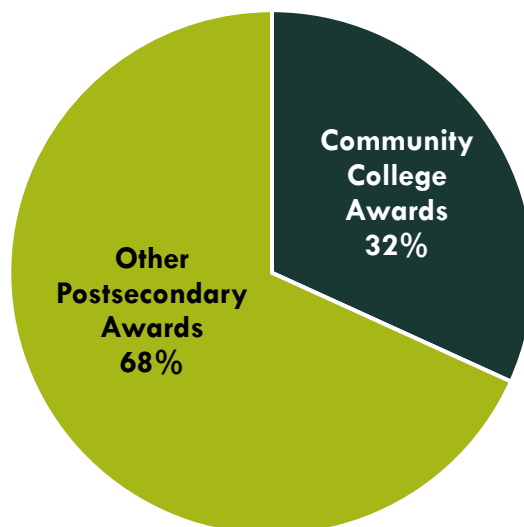

APPENDIX: OCCUPATION DESCRIPTIONS

LA COE prepared this report to provide regional labor market supply and demand data related to these target occupations:

- **Hairdressers, Hairstylists, and Cosmetologists (39-5012)** Provide beauty services, such as cutting, coloring, and styling hair, and massaging and treating scalp. May shampoo hair, apply makeup, dress wigs, remove hair, and provide nail and skincare services. ⁸
- **Makeup Artists, Theatrical and Performance (39-5091)** Apply makeup to performers to reflect period, setting, and situation of their role. ⁹
- **Skincare Specialists (39-5094)** Provide skincare treatments to face and body to enhance an individual's appearance. Includes electrologists and laser hair removal specialists. ¹⁰
